under the weight of Duke Energy toxic waste."

Vick, who has worked on waste issues since the 1990\, called the plan a \tilde{o}perpetuation of

North Carolina history of environmental injustice. She pointed out this toxic legacy, owhen

then Governor Hunt had a PCB problem in the late 1970s, he forced the PCBs on Warren

County, a poor community of color. Now, Governor McCrory has a coal ash problem- and he is

doing the same thing.ö

The precedent set if the two sites are permitted is dangerous-there are almost 100 clay

mines across North Carolina. BREDL has recommended a safer solution which would isolate the

coal ash from the land, air, surface and groundwater, and that will keep the ash on Duke Energy

property. The technology is used by the Department of Energy at the Savannah River Site.

The Blue Ridge Environmental Defense League was founded in 1984. The organization

has a thirty-year track record of victories over polluting facilities. EnvironmentaLEE is a chapter
